



GETTING IN MADRID

By car

Madrid is located right in the centre of Spain so it can be reached quite easily from all over the country since it is the centre of Spain's road network. Please check [this website](#) for information on the restricted areas and parking spots.

By train

Madrid is the main geographical hub for rail travel in Spain. Thanks to its central location, Madrid is the hub for most railway services connecting the peninsula. The city's main train station is called "Atocha" and is where most train lines converge, however, it is not the only train station in the city. You can reach directly the city notably from:

- **Valencia:** 1 hour and a half ride;
- **Seville:** 2 hours and a half ride.
- **Barcelona:** 3 hours ride.



From the train station, you can reach some of the most famous sights of Madrid (like the Reina Sofia Museum) in just a couple of minutes. Other famous parts of Madrid can take a bit more to reach so the best way could be to use public transport and for this, you can find more information [here](#).

By plane

The airport “Adolfo Suárez Madrid-Barajas” is one of the biggest and most trafficked airports in the world, from the airport you can reach the center in the following ways:

- **by taxi:** taxi waiting area in front of the airport. You can find more information on the official [website](#).
- **by bus:** several bus lines starting in the city reach the airport but it is also possible to take the Airport Express Bus which is a more direct way to reach it. More information is available on the official [website](#).
- **by metro:** with the metro line number 8 connect you can reach the airport in around 20 minutes making it the most efficient way to reach it. More information is available on the official [website](#).

On foot

By public transport

There are several options to go around Madrid because the city is well connected by several metro, bus, and tram lines. The more efficient way is of course the metro but buses and trams are a good solution if you want to admire the city while going around it.
